BUILD A MORE INCLUSIVE BOOKSHELF + BLM READING CHALLENGE

It is so important for parents to make sure that the books on their shelves reflect the diversity of America (and the kind of world they want for their children). How many books on your children's shelves feature Black and Brown characters? Characters of color are still significantly underrepresented in children's books. This is an issue that affects all children. Black and Brown children need to see themselves and people who look like them on the pages of the stories that they read, while white children will benefit from the opportunity to learn about, appreciate and honor other cultures. When children encounter diversity through books, they can learn to be empathetic, informed members of their communities who fight back against racism and other injustices.

2-IN-1 CHALLENGE

We invite you to diversify your bookshelf and participate in a reading challenge for both kids and adults.

CHALLENGE #1

Build a More Inclusive Bookshelf. Add books that center, reflect, and affirm Black children, and are written and illustrated by Black authors and artists, to your home library. We've made it easy by providing multiple book lists for all ages and reading levels, plus helpful resources for selecting and purchasing diverse books.

CHALLENGE #2

Anti-Racist Reading Challenge. We have selected a children's book for families to read and discuss together, plus two excellent options for adults to guide you on your learning journey.
